### **Town snapshot - Cape Jervis**



Cape Jervis is a picturesque coastal town located on the tip of the Fleurieu Peninsula. The rugged terrain provides a dramatic back drop to the meeting point of the Southern Ocean and Gulf St Vincent. Its residents form a close-knit community who take pride in the unique beauty of their environment. Cape Jervis has significant cultural meaning for First Nations people in particular the creation story of Tjilbruke. Cape Jervis is also home to the iconic lighthouse that continues to play a crucial role in maritime navigation.

Cape Jervis has experienced almost 70% population growth between 2011 and 2021. Although population growth has been steady for Cape Jervis over the past 10 years, it was slightly greater in the last five years. This increase is primarily due to more young people (0–24 years) and young workers (25–34 years) in the Cape Jervis township. There has also been an increase in people from 70–85 and over, which is why the median age has stayed consistent despite these changes in demographic population.

The median age for the township of Cape Jervis is 57, slightly older than the median age of the whole Council region which is 56. The biggest difference from the region data is the much great proportion of elderly residents aged 85 and over. Access to health services and transport is important for the community, with 45.5% of the community having a long-term health condition.

## The Socio-Economic Indexes for Areas (SEIFA) regard Cape Jervis as a more disadvantaged community of the broader district.

Although there is a large number of young people/young families moving into the area, Cape Jervis is still presenting as a holiday population with just over 46% of dwellings unoccupied. Almost 50% of people living in Cape Jervis are not in the labour force. Of those who are in the labour force, many are employed locally, generating 42 jobs for the township.







The District Council of Yankalilla (DCY) collaborated with the Cape Jervis community to co-create a plan for the township that would help them take charge of their future and strengthen the bonds between Council and the community.

This approach was designed to give each township context and information to help its continuing development. It also serves as a formalised document to support funding applications that engaged community organisations were making. The first two townships plans are for Cape Jervis and Myponga.

These townships continue to participate actively in civic engagement and community development, and are likely to embrace the concept and data for use.

Using information from the 2019/2020 strategic engagements as a starting point, targeted consultation was undertaken with existing groups to determine if the previous findings were still relevant. Further to this, the wider community had opportunities to provide feedback and offer current perspectives. Face-to-face public forums were facilitated, and online surveys via *YourSay* were gathered, along with adhoc meetings with community groups.

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Throughout the current process we had 153 individuals visit *YourSay* with 24 submissions to the Cape Jervis page. Via the *Let's Talk About Our Community* in-person consultation over 24 individuals provided feedback, with new priorities being identified. Interestingly themes were still relevant to community but had changed in priority order.

Previously consultation was undertaken where almost 1,250 perspectives were gathered across the district to inform the DCY Strategic Plan (2020–2024). During this consultation in 2019, seven themes were identified for Cape Jervis.

For Cape Jervis, roads had moved to the top priority, compared to being ranked at number six previously. 'Roads' includes an overtaking lane going up Cape hill, better roads, easy and quick access in case of emergencies. There was opposition reported from community regarding building South Road all the way to the Cape.

Beyond roads, transport and access to Cape Jervis remains an important theme for the community, which when combined with the health data (45% of residents have a long-term health condition) is of high importance. Specifically, the need for a bus to/from Seaford on a regular basis was identified. Port facilities and tourism also became a more prominent theme, which includes boat ramp upgrade/refurbishment. This issue was further elevated with the announcement of ferry terminal upgrades at both Cape Jervis and Penneshaw.

The community identified through this process that better and truthful advocacy for issues facing the area, in particular for infrastructure, was important. It was valuable to check in on the original 2019 priority themes and to gather the most current community perspectives.



### **Our community aspirations**



### Wharf precinct

- Upgrade boat ramp
- Mooring for larger boats
- Extend floating pontoon/add another pontoon noting that funds are paid by boat owners into SABFAC and this is opportunity for funding
- Possibility of boat ramp fees for non-locals
- Retain or replace jetty for fishing access
- Sealed designated boat ramp carpark for boats and cars need local input into master plan to ensure adequate space is allowed for this, including provision for peak times
- Traffic and road safety design elements
- Utilising local input to address local concerns
- Include truck safety ramp
- More bins at boat ramp

### Roads

- Reduce speed limits 80 from the top of the hill or from the bottom of the hill to St Vincents Drive; town area (50kph)
- Controls to deter dangerous speeding by traffic to and from the ferry, eg. speed camera, speed signs, especially James Street intersection
- Policing/police presence
- Overtaking lane going up the hill
- Seal St Vincents Drive; Range Road West
- Fix roads (Main South Road) between Myponga and Cape Jervis; pot holes
- Repairs to streets in the town
- Better roadside/vegetation maintenance
- Christie Street kerbs
- Improve street lighting

### **Public transport**

- Cape Jervis to Seaford/Seaford Meadows/Adelaide
- Cape Jervis to Yankalilla/Normanville
- Cape Jervis to Victor Harbor
- Suggestions of a minibus, reserving seats for locals on the Sealink bus and multiple daily services

### **Gateway improvements/** initiatives

- Digital display board/sign possibly near the whale bone, with ferry departure times, what's on
- Beautification of tourist information site; whale bones; tree planting down the main road
- Interpretation that explains both Aboriginal and European history/culture
- Nature playground adjacent to Heysen trailhead
- Community garden/s
- **BBQ**
- Paths footpaths, tracks and trails; safe walking trails
- Better accessibility for older people and people with limited mobility
- Footpath on both sides of the road
- Rabbit and weed control
- More rubbish bins
- Upgrading of retail/hospitality/food offerings (suggestion of supermarket)
- Multi-use areas for adventure tourism, nature-based tourism

### **Community**

- Medical services such as GP, flu vaccinations, mental health, mobile and outreach services (eg. breast screening, skin cancer screening, bone density check)

### Other - regulatory, compliance and planning issues

- Waste management
  - Ensure proper septic systems, sewerage infrastructure
  - Hard rubbish pick-up
- Investigate concerns about unauthorised buildings. (eg. sheds) and consider options to address concerns
- Addressing overgrown blocks and empty houses.
- Balanced approach to protecting current environment and 'feel' of town, while also supporting growth – particularly more businesses and services
- Investigate water supply issues; consider options
- Communication about current projects
